WHY BRAZIL

Brazil's total country population since 2007 is 189 million,¹ with 20.6 million (10.9%) of illiterate adults who are 15 years of age or more.²

There are only 4,800 public libraries in Brazil, a ratio of 1 public library for every 35,000 people.³ Meanwhile, there are more than 117,000 libraries in the United States, a ratio of 1 public library for every 2,577 people.⁵

Because book consumption in Brazil is still very low, book prices are usually very high, about \$12, and a low income family cannot afford to buy non-school children's books. Minimum wage in Brazil in 2007 is approximately US\$209 a month, while the Federal Minimum Wage in the US is approximately US\$936 a month (\$5.85/hr).

The Habit of Reading

- The Brazilian Ministry of Culture reported that approximately 1,300 municipalities in the poorest regions **don't have any public libraries.**⁴
- 61 percent of literate Brazilian adults have very little or no access to books.⁴

The Book Market

- 89 percent of Brazilian municipalities lack bookstores.⁴
- Book acquisition by North American libraries is greater than Brazil's entire book consumption.⁴
